This LGBT History Month, we're focussing on poetry and designed these lesson plans to help you celebrate with your pupils. LGBT History Month was founded by Schools Out, who have been campaigning for LGBT inclusive education for 46 years. Adapt the lesson plan to best suit the needs of your class and to fit the amount of time you have available. We have also developed lesson plans on this theme for pupils with SEND/ASN – these can be found on our website. Each lesson has a PowerPoint and resources that you can use to support your whole class teaching. Other suggested resources are noted in each lesson plan. . This lesson is based around a poem called *Grandpa's Soup*, which can be found at the source below as well as in Jackie Kay's book *Darling: new and selected poems*.

Learning objective: To be able to talk about my family and To be able to respond to a poem

Activity	Details	Resources
<p>Class activity: Listen and respond to a poem</p>	<p>Read Grandpa’s Soup by Jackie Kay to the children. When they remember an ingredient, invite a child to the front up to add it to the pan. Explain that hough is a type of beef.</p> <p>Ask: Why did Jackie like Grandpa’s soup so much? She now lives with her partner Denise. Jackie has two children, so Denise is their step-mum.</p> <p>Ask children: Who is in your family? Children should tell a partner. Choose some children to tell the class who is in their family - make sure that a diverse range of families are discussed.</p> <p>Ask children: Are any foods special to you and your family? Why are the foods special to you? Talking partners and then share as a class.</p>	<p>Props:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Big pan Water Carrot Potato Tin (relabel as hough) Barley Bowl Spoon <p>Other resources:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Collage materials

Individual activity: Grandpa's soup	Children use the Grandpa's soup recipe to help them make a collage of Grandpa's soup, sticking the 'ingredients' onto the Grandpa's soup bowl template. If they are able to, children can write the name of someone from their family that they want to share the soup with.	
Plenary: Class gallery	Pair children up with someone that had been working at a different table. They should show each other their soup collages and tell their partner who they would share their soup with.

Class activity: Our soup	As a class, re-write Grandpa's Soup to create a class poem, with ingredients you agree upon as a class.	
Individual activity: Our soup	<p>Children use the class soup recipe to help them make a collage of the soup, sticking the 'ingredients' onto the soup bowl template.</p> <p>Children should write a shopping list – either bullet pointed or as an opportunity to practice using commas.</p> <p>Children can write the name of someone from their family that they want to share the class soup with.</p>	
Plenary: Class gallery	Pair children up with someone that had been working at a different table. They should show each other their soup collages and tell their partner who they would share their soup with.




Grandpa's Soup Recipe


1. Dice the carrots.
